Dear Friends,

"Have yourself a merry little Christmas".

A line from the famous song that was first performed in the 1944 film musical 'Meet me in St Louis', has been quoted a lot this week. The Prime Minister and the media are using that quote to encourage us to pare back our Christmas plans in light of the continuing pandemic.

We are probably most familiar with the upbeat version recorded by Frank Sinatra and others but the original lyrics were considered too melancholy for Judy Garland to sing in a wartime film. They included the line 'it may be your last'. Judy Garland was also worried about that line, thinking that the truth of the lyric might be too difficult for the vast majority of people to handle. So, the lyrics were changed to the more 'acceptable' version that we know today.

But for me, there is something about the timing, the rawness and the honesty of that lyric that resonates today. This year, we have all had to face the fact of our own mortality. Stop press

Unfortunately, the indiscriminate nature of the virus has meant that the global pandemic has affected everyone in one way or another. The impact will be different for each of us, depending on our circumstances, but no-one has been immune to the many ways that the pandemic has had an impact on us. We may have lost someone close to us. We may have lost work or been financially disadvantaged by the pandemic. We have all missed time spent with family and friends. We might have suffered with our mental health or loneliness.

But there is a glimmer of light at the end of the pandemic tunnel – the vaccine. We have rejoiced at the vaccine being administered to some of the most vulnerable in our society. It is going to take time for the vaccine to be rolled out to everyone, but each vaccine is a tiny speck of light that is added to that glimmer at the end of the tunnel. We all still need to be very careful – maintaining social distance, wearing our face masks and taking particular care over hand hygiene – but we have hope ~ hope that some sense or normality will return by the end of the spring or early summer. God willing.

But thinking about those original lyrics, there is also a resonance with this time of Advent. We pray and sing 'O Come, O Come, Emmanuel! ', expressing our longing for the second return of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. We pray that this Christmas will be our last before he comes again in glory and there will be a new heaven and a new earth. So, maybe in the light of our Christian faith, we shouldn't be worried by the way the sentiment is expressed. After all, we believe that the best is yet to come; the time when we know God as completely as God knows and loves us.

So, as we prepare to celebrate the coming of the Christ Child in a much more simple way than in years gone by, maybe the lyrics for us to concentrate on this year are 'Next year..... at least we all will be together. If the Lord allows', and look forward to the time when we can gather together safely, to praise and worship the Lord with singing and joy. In the meantime 'from now on, we'll have to muddle through somehow'. We will muddle through, observing all the safety guidelines, praising God in our hearts and heads rather than with our voices, until that day when that glimmer of light is a shining beacon and we are all free of this horrible disease.

Until then, we are having to limit our numbers gathering in church, so if you would like to attend:
